RE: Authorization of City of Petersburg CFPF Capacity Building and Planning Application

Dear Ms. Howard-Cooper and Members of the CFPF Review Team:

The City of Petersburg, as you know, appreciates the work DCR has recently invested with and on behalf of the City to address problematic and recurrent flooding, as well as, to plan for future flood mitigation efforts.

As the City only recently became aware of this funding, and as such, does not presently have funding established in our current budget for the activities described herein, we respectfully request the Department of Conservation and Recreation waive our match requirement for Capacity Building and Planning. It is critical that the City hire a Floodplain Administrator that is a Certified Floodplain Manager as soon as possible, and the Community Flood Preparedness Funds (CFPF) would enable us to initiate that process far sooner than possible using local funds. Further, the CFPF would allow the City to create and adopt a Resilience Plan that pulls together both local and regional initiatives in a project-based, City-wide effort. Presently, the concept is a placeholder in our 2040 draft Comprehensive Plan. Finally, the CFPF would enable us to establish a data-driven Community Outreach Plan to educate our residents and property owners on floodplain management. This living document would serve as a guide for the newly created Floodplain Administrator to hit the ground running with training resources and outreach strategies, clearly documented enabling immediate effectiveness at moving toward our goal of equitable floodplain management.

Please accept this letter as my authorization of the request for CFPF assistance to enable the City to make significant progress toward planning for Resilience and equitable management of our floodplains.



CFPF Grant Application: Capacity Building & Planning

1.0. Scope of Work Narrative

The City of Petersburg is subject to recurrent or repetitive flooding due to inadequate and antiquated storm sewer systems. Flood related issues in the City of Petersburg are well documented. To-date in 2021, there have been at least six news segments devoted to reporting on flood or flood-related issues, an example of which is provided in **Appendix A**. In addition to the media attention regarding flooding, the City has recently been contacted by the Department of Conservation and Recreation regarding homeowner flooding complaints associated with the City's management of its National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). In response to these issues, the City is planning to implement new strategies to improve flooding conditions and is seeking assistance from the Community Flood Preparedness Fund with this application.

Ultimately, the City plans to implement flood prevention and protection projects and studies in areas that are subject to recurrent flooding as confirmed by a local certified floodplain manager; however, first the City must establish and fill a Floodplain Administrator position and develop a Resilience Plan. All work funded by this application and subsequent projects will be to mitigate future flood damage and to assist the City with floodplain compliance administration. The City is a low-income geographic area, as defined in the CFPF Grant Manual, as an area where the median household income (\$38,679) is significantly less than 80% of the local median household income (\$74,222 in VA), according to the US Census Data in 2019¹. Further, several areas in the City are designated as Qualified Opportunity Zones, as presented in the attached map (**Appendix B**). Priority, once the City's floodplain program is better established, will be on community-scale hazard mitigation and nature-based solutions focused in the Opportunity Zones, when feasible.

The following are the objectives of the scope of work for this project, as outlined in the CFPF Grant Manual:

- 1. Assessment of capacity needs and assets:
 - a. The City of Petersburg has identified the following resource needs:
 - i. Financial Both a Resilience Plan and an in-house Floodplain Administrator/Certified Floodplain Manager are required pre-requisites for any project implementation funding via the Community Flood Preparedness Fund. Though there is a clear and documented need, the City does not have these items specified in the FY2021-2022 budget.
 - ii. Human The City lacks the resources to hire and fund a CFM position in the immediate future; thus, is seeking CFPF grant funding assistance to fill this position for the next three years.
 - iii. Technical Assistance The City is seeking CFPF grant funding to execute a contract with a Consultant to develop a Resilience Plan. The Resilience Plan, once adopted, will be a component of the City's 2040 Comprehensive Plan, presently in draft.
 - iv. Training The City expects to hire a CFM and expects to partner with a third party to develop and train the CFM on a Public Outreach Plan that will be developed with this funding.
 - b. The City will both hire new staff and utilize the expertise of Consultants to develop, increase, and strengthen knowledge, skills, and abilities regarding floodplain management in the City as described above and below.

- c. The City has an established track record of utilizing grant funds to assist with resource development and plans to continue to utilize established partnerships and public funding to enhance capacity while it builds internal resources over the next three years.
- d. The City plans to seek additional funding via the Studies portion of the CFPF to manage and update floodplain policies.
- 2. Goals and objectives tied to improving flood protection and prevention in a whole community approach to resilience.

The goals of this project are three-fold: 1) to enable the City to fast track hiring a qualified certified floodplain manager, 2) to enable the City to develop a Resilience Plan, as identified in the draft 2040 Comprehensive Plan, using the technical assistance, and 3) to enable the City to develop a GIS-based Outreach Plan to engage and educate residents and property owners impacted by the City's floodplains, and beyond.

3. Stakeholder identification, outreach, and education strategies.

The City needs to formally identify stakeholders and to conduct outreach and education activities to equitably manage its floodplains. The City will retain a Consultant to help develop a GIS-based Outreach Plan that identifies impacted residents and property owners and creates strategies for education and implementation by the CFM.

4. Implementation plan and timelines for specific elements of completion such as training, certifications, plan development, etc.

The City will complete all requested grant activities within the 36-month window allowable for this cycle of CFPF grant funds. The following timeline outlines more specifically the City's intended activity schedule:

- November 5, 2021 CFPF Round 2 Applications due
- December 5, 2021 Announcements anticipated by VA DCR
- January 30, 2022 Contracts in place, NTP for Consultant, initiate Year 1 of CFM salary funding
- July 5, 2022 CFM position filled
- September 1, 2022 Resilience Plan presented to Council
- November 1, 2022 Resilience Plan approved by DCR and finalized for inclusion in City's 2040 Comprehensive Plan
- January 30, 2023 Outreach Plan completed
- February 1, 2023 Begin implementation of Outreach Plan
- July 1, 2023 City to implement FY23-24 budget that includes funding for CFM position
- January 30, 2024 Anticipated end of Project (36 months after award)
- March 1, 2024 No later than 30 days after each activity is complete, all digital copies of completed work submitted to <u>cfpf@dcr.virginia.gov</u> along with the completed Certificate of Approval of Floodplain Management
- May 1, 2024 No later than 90 days after project completion, final reimbursement request is due to DCR
- Responsible parties for capacity building and/or plan development process. The City of Petersburg, Department of Public Works, will be responsible for overseeing and implementing all grant activities.

6. Performance outputs and measures.

Success of the proposed project will be measured by the clear outcomes of a physical presence in the role of Floodplain Administrator/CFM and tangible Resilience Plan and Outreach Plan documents. Electronic versions of the documents will be submitted in accordance with the City's grant agreement.

7. Plans for maintaining capacity, as necessary, over the long term. The City intends to maintain capacity, particularly regarding the Floodplain Administrator role, through the funds generated by Stormwater Utility.

1.1. Floodplain Administrator/CFM Position

The City will use funding from the Community Flood Preparedness Fund to fill a role of Floodplain Administrator/CFM for a period of 3 years. The City has developed a position description and budget to fund the role (refer to **Appendix C**). Once the grant term expires, the City will fund the position and/or seek additional resources to maintain continuity of the program and to comply with federal regulations.

1.2. Resilience Plan

The Resilience Plan is a component in the City's Draft Comprehensive Plan 2040 under the Safety Element (Item 8) in the table of contents and the Plan Elements under the Environment section (Item 6).

The City intends to utilize a Consultant to develop one document that meets the elements described in the definitions section of the CFPF Manual:

- 1. Project-based with projects focused on flood control and resilience.
- 2. Incorporates nature-based infrastructure to the maximum extent possible.
- 3. Includes considerations of all parts of a local government regardless of socioeconomics or race.
- 4. Includes coordination with other local and inter-jurisdictional project, plan, and activities and has a clearly articulated timeline or phasing for plan implementation.
- 5. Based on the best available science and incorporates climate change, sea level rise, and storm surge (where appropriate), and current flood maps.

Please refer to **Appendix D** for the scope and fee provided by the Consultant. The City will execute the task order agreement upon notification of grant award.

1.3 Community Outreach Plan

The City will use a Consultant for technical assistance to create a GIS-based Outreach Plan to engage the socially and physically vulnerable areas within the community for floodplain education. The purpose of the plan is to create a targeted communication strategy with a group of impacted residents and property owners to ultimately achieve the long-term goal of the City of equitable management of the floodplain. Once the plan is developed, it will serve as the framework for the CFM to implement.

The Outreach Plan will include, at a minimum:

- A summary of training and educational resources, with specific emphasis on resources provided by the Virginia Floodplain Management Program, and support of DCR's Division of Dam Safety and Floodplains.
- Identification of planning teams and stakeholder advisory groups.
- GIS data assessment of flood damage risk, targeting structures in the floodway and floodplain, with consideration for storm event frequency and intensity, climate change, previous impacts, elevation, structure type, disruptions to service, number of parcels impacted, *etc*.

- Mapping and creation of exhibits and/or renderings to assist with understanding data interpretation and public education.
- Identification of delivery methods, with consideration for local internet capacity, COVID-19, and other factors such as consideration for owner-occupancy. The City's percentage of owner-occupied housing units is 38.8%, according to Census data; therefore, consideration must be given to reach property owners that may not live in the impacted areas.
- Considerations and recommendations for selecting and prioritizing flood improvement projects.
- Reporting, including specific strategies, targeted and measurable outcomes, and schedules for implementation of the Outreach Plan.
