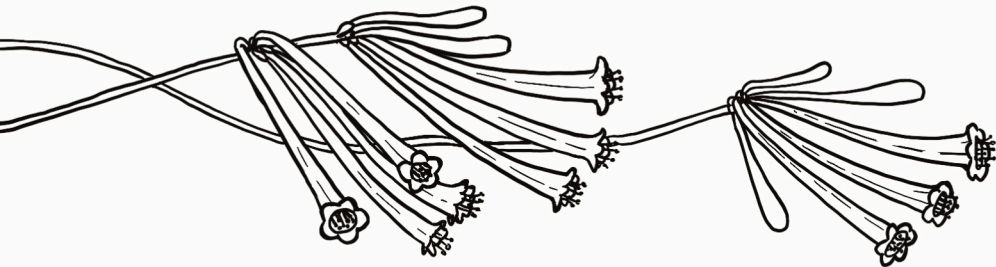


Dedication

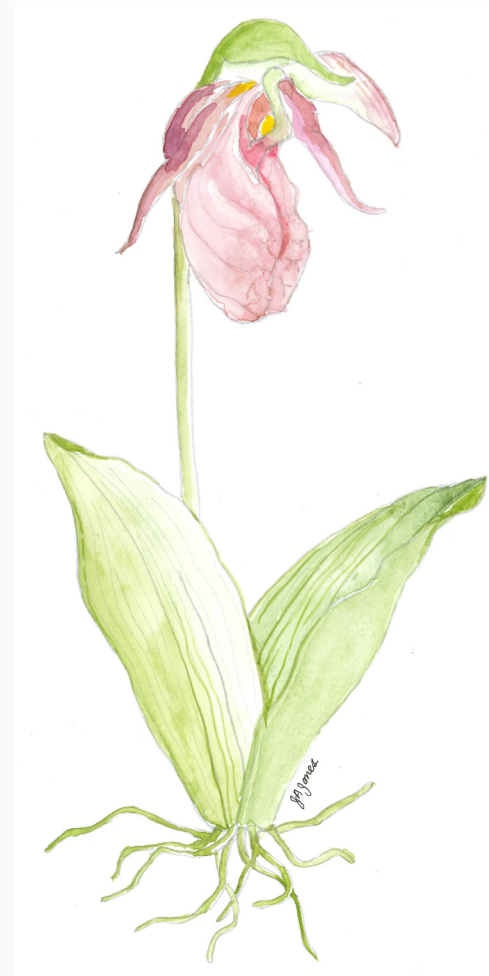

She is currently an MS student at the University of Nebraska in entomology, and teaches as a lecturer at Longwood University in Farmville, VA.
