

## Important Details

- There are no indoor facilities at the park; however, there is a picnic shelter that can be utilized. In the event of rain, field trips may have to be rescheduled.
- The park does have vault toilets available, but no running water.
- Teacher and/or chaperone participation is encouraged.
- Students should wear proper attire for outdoor activities, including closed-toed shoes and clothes that can get dirty.
- Feel free to pack a lunch and enjoy our picnic area while here.
- Standard field trip and activities will be held from 9 a.m. - 3 p.m. They can last anywhere from 45 minutes to two hours, depending on the activities planned.
- If bringing buses, be sure your drivers have previewed the road **before** the day of your trip. Make sure they feel confident and comfortable about driving down to the park. If there is an issue, other accommodations can be made.
- Depending on the time of year and group age/size, fishing may also be available. Additional fees apply.

## Fee Details

- Fees: Field trips, private group programs, \$3/participant or \$30/class (25 students) whichever is more cost efficient. No fees for Title 1 schools.
- All field trips may be paid in full at the time of the program or an invoice may be sent to you following your field trip and payment made at a later date. Forms of payment include: cash or check (made out to *Treasurer of Virginia*).
